DIALOGUE WRITING

What is a Dialogue?

A dialogue is a conversation between two individuals on a topic understood and related to by both. It is an exchange of thoughts and opinions on any kind of topic or issue. A dialogue may either aim to form a concurrenceofthoughtortodifferentiateone'spointofviewfromtheothers.

Format of a Dialogue

A dialogue does not have any distinct format. However, some rules need to be followed to avoid confusion while pairing a statement with its speaker.

 When the names of speakers are not mentioned, the dialogues should be written withinquotation marks.

Example: "I have an appointment today."

"What time is it?"

- Insuchcases,attributionslike,hesaid',,shereplied'etc.shouldalsobeincluded.Example
 "I do not trust that man." hesaid.
- An attribution when used at the beginning of a sentence should always be followed by a comma (,).
 Example: She said, "This is the clue we were lookingfor."
- When names of the speakers are included, they should be followed by a colon mark (:).

Example:Rita: How may I helpyou?

MrRao: Could you tell me the way to theboardroom?

Every time the speaker changes, a new line should be used.

Example: Mother: What time will you beback?

Sara: The class will get over by 4, so I should be home by4.30.

Mother: I may not be at home when you come, but I will make some snacks for you

beforeleaving.

Tips for Writing a Dialogue

- A written dialogue should appear spontaneous; therefore, do not include elaboratesentences.
- While writing a dialogue, ensure that thoughts are expressedclearly.
- Make a short outline at the beginning so that all important points are given sufficientcredit.
- Arrangement of ideas in a logical sequence is equally important. Jumping back and forth withthoughts makes the piece appearimmature.
